ABOUT STONE SOULS: THE COLLABORATION PROCESS

Stone Souls is about the development of a shared vision for a show and the extensive collaboration of two artists during the pandemic.

Greg Watts and Alice Bedard-Voorhees started a conversation about jointly proposing a show at the 2020 Valley Visual Art Show at Carbondale Arts. Alice was familiar with Watts' fine-art photographic work, and he with her mixed media and prints.

Greg and Alice met in February 2020 just before the pandemic shut-down. They agreed that a commonality was love of stones and stone places, especially in the West where each had both hiked and rafted and camped. They planned to start sharing some ideas after a month and agreed that their works would be created on paper. That would be the only in person meeting until the summer of 2020 when they took a masked hike to talk about a more involved shoot.

During that time Alice and Greg began sharing readings and some of digital photos of they work to help define their commonality for a vision: the acknowledgement of relationships of human beings with other forms in our world and how these beings "reveal themselves to humans" (Hallowel and Vivieros de Castro), and the draw of humans to stone places over time. For Greg, it was about capturing stone in time, and the presence of other humans drawn to the same places that speak to their relationship to those same places hundreds of years prior. For Alice it was making works that depict stones as relatives or extended family.

Via email and phone they finalized a proposal, researched magnetic hanging systems and papers. Greg's work comes from shooting images and editing and printing them, and for this show he experimented with washi and bamboo papers as substraits for his works. Alice often shoots images as source ideas that are transformed through traditional printmaking techniques or using digital printing over painted papers.

During that time Alice also learned about photopolymer printmaking—a technique for developing printing plates for a press via photo-exposure techniques, which allowed her to use digital images in much larger works than she had previously.

What they really wanted to do was visit a site where Greg would photograph and Alice would shoot images for source ideas. They were finally able to meet in November at Cedar Mesa in Utah, descend into the canyon and spend two days viewing the Big Man Panels and other pictographs. Some of the work in this show were inspired by that trip.

Working across two mediums has been a learning opportunity for both artists. Because they had to work across multiple communication channels while developing this show, Greg and Alice had the occasion to not only learn but support each other through the isolation and concerns of this time.
